

BELOW DECK

THIS DECK CREW IS THE BEST ON THE WATER

rom donuts to dining and drinks, the back patio has turned a bit dicey in the last few seasons. After some discussions with Four Seasons Marina and some preliminary investigation into the condition of the deck, the FSYC Board approved the plan to rebuild one of the cornerstones of the club experience.

A budget for the project was approved at the March 13 Board meeting, with demolition beginning the next day. All the deck boards were removed, exposing significant rot in the joists and confirming the continued top-level repairs were futile. It was estimated the deck was at least forty years old – *well* past its useful life.

The project materials list, the materials sourcing for the budget was next. On March 31, lumber, joist hangers, screws and miscellaneous supplies were delivered to Four Seasons Marina. removed the pile of old decking material from the side

deck and transported the new lumber from the upper parking lot down to the clubhouse. They used their work barge to get the lumber to the side deck.

On April 1, the rotted joists were removed and replaced them with new 2 x 10s. The decking was underway within a few days, but the rising river put work on hold. Mother Nature halted everything as we waited for the river to recede and a decent day to get back to work.

Finally, April 12 brought a clear, warm day for the crew to finished after 9 hours. The beautiful new deck is sturdy and safe with a foundation of 2 x 10 joists on sixteen inch canters and screwed together for top structural integrity.

We look forward to seeing everyone on deck this season. Remember to thank the crew!



Up next is our official kickoff with the Derby Party hosted by the Postlers and Freys.







FLOOD OF MEMORIES

We love the river a lot, but maybe not 60 feet of it ...

incinnati has experienced significant flooding throughout its history, primarily due to the Ohio River overflowing its banks. While FSYC is always eager for the river, flooding has significant impacts on the quality and safety of the water and community.

The Ohio River recently crested at **60.79 feet**, marking the highest level in nearly a decade. While a river town like Cincinnati expects to deal with seasonally high water, this area has had some notable floods. These pictures show the last few weeks, but let's look back in time to see what the Ohio River has done.
















RAMP UP














COLD RECEPTION

The excitement of splashing in can come with unwelcome surprises.

h, the joys of seasonal boat owner-ship! While many of us spend the off season counting down the days until we drop in and begin what is more time cleaning the boat than we remember from last season, there can often be some frustration finding something isn't working the way it was when the boat went into hibernation.

There are a few common reasons why boats tend to have issues after winter storage:

Moisture Damage: Even if your boat was stored properly, trapped moisture can lead to corrosion, mold, or electrical issues.

Fuel System Trouble: Untreated fuel can degrade, clog lines, or cause injector problems.

Battery Drain: Batteries can lose charge over winter, and a neglected battery might refuse to be revived.

Freezing Damage: If water was left in the engine or plumbing systems, it could expand and cause cracks.

Dried-Out Seals & Hoses: Rubber parts can dry out or crack, leading to leaks once the boat is back in action.

SPRING AWAKENING


Volunteering for events is simple, supported, and comes with perks!

etting your boat ready for spring means 5. reversing winterization and ensuring everything is in top shape for the season. Here's a step-by-step guide to prepare your boat:

- Inspect the hull & exterior for cracks, blisters and damage from dry storage. Remove barnacle or algae build up if stored in the water.
- 2. Clean the hull and apply a fresh coat of wax for protection. If stored in water, inspect for algae or barnacle buildup.
- 3. Check the engine & fuel system, including an oil change and filter replacement. Look for cracked hoses.
- 4. Top off the gas tank with fresh fuel. Check coolant levels and flush the system, if needed.

- Recharge or replace the battery, if necessary. Inspect wiring for corrosion or wear, as well as test lights, gauges and electronics.
- Inspect the safety equipment on board for items in good working order and not expired. Test fire extinguishers and check distress signals (flares, air horns).
- 7. Test the plumbing and bilge system and clean up any debris. Flush water lines and ensure proper operation of sinks and toilets. Check hoses and fittings for leaks.
- 8. Inspect the propeller for dings or bends, lubricate moving parts in the steering system. Check rudder alignment and cable tension.
- 9. Replace old dock lines, bumpers, and mooring gear if needed. Replace sunscreen if it is past expiration.





DON'T DRINK THE WATER

Not just a "Dave Matthews Band" song ...

he Ohio River has been receding after recent flooding, but water quality can take time to stabilize. Floods often introduce sediment, debris, and pollutants into the river. This definitely impacts river quality in the months that follow, including summer. Here's why:

Increased Sediment and Debris – Floodwaters churn up soil, rocks, and organic matter, leading to murky water. This can reduce sunlight penetration and affect aquatic ecosystems.

Pollutant Runoff – Heavy rains and flooding often wash fertilizers, sewage, and industrial waste into the river. This can spike bacteria levels, making swimming or fishing hazardous.

Algae Blooms – Extra nutrients from runoff can fuel harmful algal blooms during the hot summer months, reducing oxygen levels and harming wildlife.

Changes in Flow & Temperature – Rivers take time to stabilize after flooding and overall water health.

ORSANCO - (Ohio River Valley Water Sanitation Commission) provides weekly water quality reports for multiple locations along the river, including Cincinnati.

The Flood of 2018: The river crested at 60 feet, leading to significant flooding in areas like East End, California, and New Richmond, Ohio. Many of the same communities were previously affected in 1997.

The Flood of 1997: The Ohio River reached **64.48 feet**, causing widespread damage and displacing thousands of residents. This flood was one of the worst in recent decades.

The river can bring joy or devastation, but community is constant

The Great Flood of 1937 was the most devastating flood in Cincinnati's history. Between January 13-25, just under fourteen inches of rain fell, with the Ohio River cresting at **80 feet** on January 26, 1937.

Initially projected and reported to have limited impact, the flood left 350 people dead and nearly a million homeless, causing an estimated \$500 million in damages (about \$11 billion today).

Even those on higher ground dealt with critical shortages of vital essentials such as water, electricity, and heat. Already weathering the Great Depression, residents of Cincinnati experienced conditions that further tested their humanity and resolve. The legacy of resilience and community runs as deep as the Ohio River.
